

**YOUTHFUL DIRECTOR KYLE SHEA'S DARK COMEDY SHINES A LIGHT ON THE GOLDEN YEARS
WITH "WHERE IT STOPS" SCREENINGS AT BIG BEAR AND BOSTON FILM FESTIVALS**

Los Angeles, CA -- Film director and recent college graduate Kyle Shea casts a youthful eye on aging with his dark comedy, "Where It Stops," which was screened at film festivals on both coasts -- the Big Bear Film Festival in Los Angeles on September 18 and the Boston Film Festival in Boston on September 22.

This dark comedy short film follows 78-year-old Barbara Stack through her golden years at Willow Creek Assisted Living Residences. Weary with redundancy and compliance, Barbara searches for her last shot of life with the help of her fellow residents, Lilly and Joanne. Armed with desperation and innovation, the three women set out on a journey to find out when "it" starts, and where "it" stops.

This emerging storyteller graduated in May 2009 from the Dodge College of Film and Media Arts at Chapman University in Los Angeles. He produced "Where it Stops" as his senior thesis, winning acclaim with a nomination for best editing at the university's annual award show. Chapman's growing prestige in the film world is evident in its recent recognition as the best school for "Spielbergs Not Bound for USC, NYU, or UCLA" in the 2010 NEWSWEEK/Kaplan College Guide.

Kyle, who discovered his passion for film while in St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Fort Lauderdale, started an action sports production company before he graduated college. After interning at NBC and Telemundo he decided to pursue a career in directing and editing.
